# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) established the Oregon High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA) in June 1999. Oregon HIDTA was renamed the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA in 2015 with the addition of Idaho counties. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA is one of 33 regional HIDTA programs in the country which consists of 16 counties, 12 counties in Oregon (Clackamas, Deschutes, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Linn, Malheur, Marion, Multnomah, Umatilla, and Washington) and 4 counties in Idaho (Ada, Bannock, Canyon, and Kootenai).

This is the nineteenth year the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA program has reported enforcement initiative operational targets and subsequent outcomes using the HIDTA Performance Management Process (PMP) reporting system. The data and statistics contained in this report illustrate how the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA program is achieving the ONDCP / National HIDTA goals which are to interrupt the drug flow by disrupting and dismantling Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTO) and Money Laundering Organizations (MLO) and to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives.


With analytical and intelligence support from the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Information Sharing and Analytical Coordination Center (ISACC) leveraging our relationship with Oregon and Idaho National Guard Counterdrug Programs, law enforcement initiatives operating in the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Program continue to make significant progress in identifying, investigating, disrupting and dismantling those drug traffickers and money launderers organization operating in and through the Oregon Idaho HIDTA area of responsibility.

# FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Oregon-Idaho HIDTA received \$4,839,385 in baseline and discretionary funds from the Office of National Drug Control Policy in 2023. Consistent with years past, the baseline funding of \$4,229,000 was authorized while \$610,485 in discretionary funding was provided. The Executive Board distributed those funds based on the identified threat, the strategy to address the threat, and the needs of the established initiatives to address the threat within the designated area of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA program.

The discretionary funds for 2023 were awarded in furtherance of continued funding for two analyst positions focusing on shell casing submissions and analysis for seized drug crime

guns utilizing the National Integrated Ballistics Information Network (NIBIN). ONDCP also awarded discretionary funding for an Oregon Demand Reduction Strategy position and equipment needs for initiatives to enhance their enforcement efforts.



# 2023 PROGRAM OUTPUTS AND OUTCOMES

The mission of the HIDTA program is to disrupt the market for illegal drugs in the United States in support of the National Drug Control Strategy by assisting federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement entities participating in the HIDTA program to dismantle and disrupt DTOs and MLOs, with particular emphasis on drug trafficking regions that have harmful effects on other parts of the United States. The HIDTA program goals are as follows:

**GOAL 1:** Disrupt the market for illegal drugs by dismantling or disrupting DTOs and MLOs; and

GOAL 2: Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA supported 24 initiatives responsible for meeting the program goals in 2023. The initiatives focused on investigations (15), criminal interdiction (3), fugitive apprehension (1), criminal prosecution (1), analytical and deconfliction support to include Overdose Response Strategy (ORS) (1), training (1), demand reduction (1) and program management and administration (1). Additionally, through discretionary funding, the program has invested in 2 analysts to support the NIBIN program. The following is a synopsis of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA's 2023 outputs and outcomes in support of the program's goals.

# GOAL 1: Disrupt the market for illegal drugs by dismantling or disrupting DTOs and MLOs

# DTO AND MLO INVESTIGATIONS


In 2023, Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement initiatives investigated 117 DTOs and MLOs operating within the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA region, 79 of which were disrupted and/ or dismantled. Many of the DTOs investigated have an identified money laundering function built into their organization.

# 2023 Task Force led DTO Investigations by Drug Type





Fentanyl and/or methamphetamine were/are trafficked by 64 of the 78 DTOs disrupted or dismantled by Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives during 2023. DTOs trafficking more than one drug with source connections to criminal organizations operating in Mexico accounted for 52% of the organizations investigated during the year.

# INITIATIVE DRUG SEIZURES

# by type of drug, number of seizures, and weight seized


Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives continued to seize larger amounts of fentanyl in powder and pill forms. The amount of methamphetamine slightly increased, while cocaine and black-market bulk marijuana seizures decreased. Heroin seizure incidents and amounts continued to significantly decrease in 2023, with 30% fewer seizure incidents and 44% less weight seized compared to 2022. In total, initiatives reported more than 178,415.5 kilograms, and 3,706,886 dosage units of all illicit drugs seized, including diverted controlled prescription pills.

### ASSET SEIZURES

Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives seized approximately \$9.2 million in cash and assets in 2023. Cash seizures accounted for 56% of the asset value seized (\$5,187,258) and real estate and personal property accounted for the remaining 44% (\$4,068,984). These seizures, combined with the estimated wholesale value of drugs seized by initiatives of \$1,079,989,180, resulted in a return on investment (ROI) of \$225.07 for every HIDTA dollar spent in 2023.





# CLANDESTINE LAB SEIZURES

Clandestine tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) extraction laboratories related to black-market marijuana extract production remain the predominant lab seized by law enforcement agencies in Oregon, accounting for 57% (8) of the total clandestine laboratories seized during 2023. The remaining laboratories consisted of pill and brick presses related to the production of counterfeit pills containing fentanyl or alprazolam (4) seized in the Portland metropolitan area and two production laboratories for dimethyltryptamine (DMT) were seized in Oregon and Idaho.


# Clandestine and Conversion Laboratory Seizures

# ARRESTS, FIREARMS SEIZED, AND OTHER OUTPUTS

During 2023, Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives conducted 2.645 arrests and seized 1.085 firearms related to drug investigations. The enforcement initiatives conducted 58 authorized wire intercepts, DEA monitored 54 wire intercepts in Oregon and Idaho and 4 were monitored by Medford Area Drug and Gang Enforcement Medford. (MADGE) in Oregon.

The United States Marshals Service Fugitive Task Force (USMS FTF) worked with Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives to apprehend fugitives associated with their investigations throughout Oregon. During 2022, USMS FTF apprehended 1,111 fugitives, 131 (12%) of which were for drug or drug-related charges.



# **PROSECUTIONS**

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA supported one prosecution initiative located at the District of Idaho United States Attorney's Office. HIDTA funded a Special Assistant United States Attorney (SAUSA) position that provided prosecution support to HIDTA enforcement initiatives. During 2023, the SAUSA facilitated 22 suspect indictments, 37 prosecutions, and 13 convictions. A total of 31 search warrants, 5 court orders, and 2 wire intercept orders were reviewed and approved during the year.



# **GOAL 2:** Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives

# ANALYTICAL CASE SUPPORT

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Information Sharing and Analytical Coordination Center (ISACC) serves as the hub for both Oregon and Idaho case deconfliction of drug investigations. ISACC personnel interact with drug intelligence officers (DIO) and public health analysts (PHA) in both states to engage in and support ORS efforts. The ISACC initiative focuses its efforts on the emerging threats among federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies in the region. ISACC produced and published three bulletins shared with law enforcement and public health partners related to emerging regional drug threats. Additionally, the bulletins were shared across HIDTA partners to have a greater impact nationally. Over 100 public safety and public health partners received the publications. Those who responded to the post-distribution survey indicated the publication content was useful and effective.

In 2023, criminal intelligence analysts from local, state, and federal agencies assigned to drug enforcement initiatives provided analytical services for 743 cases in Oregon and Idaho. The Oregon and Idaho National Guard Counterdrug Support Program provided most of the analytical support to the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA initiatives through embedded counterdrug analysts. Case support provided by the analysts was accurate and useful to the task force officers, based on survey data collected during the DTO submission and evaluation process.


# **DECONFLICTION**

The initiatives utilized RISSIntel and RISSafe, provided by the Regional Information Sharing Systems (RISS) through support from Western States Information Network (WSIN) and Rocky Mountain Information Network (RMIN) as well as Case Explorer, to deconflict case information and enforcement operations. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement initiatives submitted 1,836 operation and 22,747 case information deconflictions during 2023.

# TRAINING PROVIDED

The mission of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA Training Initiative is to enhance the efficiency effectiveness of the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA enforcement, intelligence, and support initiatives in the region through training, networking, information-sharing opportunities. This is accomplished by providing relevant, requested, highpriority training on a regular and timely basis. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA has partnered with the Oregon Narcotics Enforcement Association and the Idaho Narcotics Enforcement Association to maximize training and networking opportunities for narcotics enforcement officers throughout the region. During 2023, over 15,000 hours of training were provided by the initiative.

# DRUG PREVENTION

In 2023, Oregon-Idaho HIDTA partnered with and provided support to two drug prevention initiatives to enhance the impact of public awareness and safety surrounding drug use and abuse. Lines for Life is a regional program dedicated to preventing substance abuse and suicide, and Children Learning through Education and Research (CLEAR) Alliance, which focuses on prevention and reducing youth substance abuse and impaired driving through fact-based education.

# Lines for Life

Lines for Life is an Oregon nonprofit dedicated to preventing substance abuse and suicide and promoting mental wellness. The organization has three principal priorities: crisis intervention, prevention work, and policy work around mental wellness. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA and Lines for Life have long partnered on prevention work – beginning with HIDTA support provided through a Drug-Free Communities grant, to innovative work distributing naloxone to law enforcement in response to the

opioid crisis and more recently, focusing on long-term, system change around substance use. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA has supported two key initiatives in recent years; the annual Conference on Opioids and Other Drugs, Pain and Addiction Treatment (OPAT) and the YouthLine program located in Bend, Oregon.

The OPAT conference has become a valuable event for professionals involved in changing the way we address and prevent addiction in Oregon. Each year the conference hosts nationally recognized speakers for 350-400 participants from law enforcement, health systems, public health, recovery community, addiction treatment providers, and others to share effective strategies for better combating the addiction crisis in Oregon. The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA was a founding partner in this work over 10 years ago, which has grown into a premier event for change in Oregon.

YouthLine serves communities throughout Jefferson, Crook, and Deschutes County, and with a new YouthLine call center in collaboration with the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs Reservation – providing youth-to-youth crisis text and phone hotline aimed to help teens deescalate crises and navigate challenges such as substance use, bullying, and depression. Young volunteers work in the program to help teens develop healthy coping skills as they encounter the stresses of growing up. By delivering healthier coping skills and helping teens build supportive networks, YouthLine provides an alternative to unhealthy coping alternatives such as substance and alcohol use – thus building lifelong skills to prevent addiction.

#### CLEAR Alliance

CLEAR Alliance, a 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization, is the fiscal agent of the Redmond Area Community Coalition (RACC), servicing the Central Oregon area. CLEAR Alliance and the RACC's mission is to educate youth and adults to prevent substance misuse and impaired driving. This is achieved through promoting mental health and wellness and by providing evidence-based prevention education programs. Available programs include free courses and instructor training on the topics of Tobacco, Marijuana, and E-Cigarettes (TMEC), Impaired Driving Education (IDEC), and Counterfeit Pill Education (CPEC).

CLEAR Alliance has seen much growth at the state level and the national level. 2023 was a big year for the organization, from curriculum and courses being utilized in 23 states, the development of a new 'Did You Know' campaign, the completion of 3 new impaired driving-related commercials, and the completion and launch of the Counterfeit Pill Education Course (CPEC).

It has been nearly one year since the Counterfeit Pill Education Course (CPEC) began. In that time CPEC has been running anonymous survey data which shows a consistent increase in learners' knowledge upon completion of the course. When asked in a pre-survey, "How much do you know about fentanyl?", half of the learners (50.00%) responded as knowing a little. When asked the same question in a post-survey after completing the course, a little more than half (52.05%) of the respondents answered they felt they knew a lot. These numbers indicate a progressive increase in knowledge after taking the Counterfeit Pill Education Course (CPEC), which supports potential lives saved.

# OVERDOSE RESPONSE STRATEGY

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA ORS strategic purpose includes information engagement with law enforcement, coordination with public health, and supporting the prevention mission. The ORS is a national HIDTA initiative designed to enhance public health and public safety collaboration, harm reduction, and strengthen and improve efforts to reduce drug overdoses across all states and HIDTA regions. With support from ONDCP and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Foundation (CDCF), the ORS initiative supports local, state, and regional innovation.

The Oregon-Idaho HIDTA ORS team consists of a Drug Intelligence Officer (DIO) and Public Health Analyst (PHA) in both Oregon and Idaho. Together they work to provide technical assistance to local jurisdictions; produce educational materials; increase data sharing; and promote national ORS goals. The DIOs support HIDTA's traditional goal to disrupt and dismantle drug trafficking organizations, by facilitating felony arrest notifications (FANs) and Parcel Interdiction Notifications (PINs) that connect investigations across jurisdictions.

# DISCRETIONARY FUND EXPENDITURES

Mobile Mass Spectrometer MX-908

The MX-908 is a handheld mass spectrometer that detects compounds at trace levels utilizing high-pressure mass spectrometry to accurately detect and identify hazardous chemicals, explosives, and drugs in air, liquid, and solid samples. In 2022, the Oregon-Idaho HIDTA supported the purchase of an MX-908 device that was placed into service in December 2022 by the MADGE team in Medford, Oregon. In 2023, the Clackamas County Interagency Task Force (CCITF) through HIDTA supplemental funding, and the Westside Interagency Narcotics (WIN) task force in Washington County, Oregon through funding from public health, both purchased the device. The device enables investigators to safely test drug samples seized during investigations without the need for opening packages reducing the risk of accidental exposure to dangerous drugs like fentanyl.

# NIBIN Analyst Support

In 2023 the Oregon Idaho HIDTA program, received discretionary funding to support the NIBIN program through the hiring of two crime gun analysts to work in concert with the Portland Police Bureau and the Salem Police Department in Oregon. These analysts receive, submit, and evaluate the correlation returns for recovered shell casings from firearms seized across multiple drug investigations. During 2023, 641 of the 1,085 firearms seized by Oregon and Idaho enforcement initiatives were processed through the Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms (ATF) ETrace program and 219 firearms were processed through NIBIN. It is anticipated those figures will increase dramatically in 2024 as more agencies adopt test-fire policies to facilitate NIBIN submissions.
